



# Democracy and Cultural Diversity in Indonesia

May 21 – June 4, 2017

This study abroad program is coordinated by the Northern Illinois University Study Abroad Office (SAO), in cooperation with the NIU College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Department of Political Science, the NIU Center for Southeast Asian Studies and the American Institute for Indonesian Studies (AIFIS), Yogyakarta Office.

**PROGRAM DATES:** The program will officially begin on Sunday, May 21, 2017 in Yogyakarta, and will end on Sunday, June 4, 2017. Students will be responsible for making their own air travel arrangements in order to arrive in Yogyakarta by no later than 5pm on Sunday, May 21. A shuttle pickup at the Yogyakarta Adisucipto International Airport will be arranged for the students to take them to the hotel.

Students enrolled in the program are required to participate in pre-program classes held on May 10 and May 17, 2017 and post-program classes on August 23 and 30, 2017.

**PROGRAM DIRECTOR:** Kikue Hamayotsu, Associate Professor of Political Science in the NIU College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and faculty associate at the NIU Center for Southeast Asian Studies, is a political scientist whose expertise include politics and religion, Southeast Asian politics, identity politics and state-society relations in the Muslim world. Her current research interest is focused on religious intolerance and freedom in the context of democratic transition in the Muslim-majority Southeast Asian states. She has extensive living and working experiences in Indonesia and Malaysia. She is currently Vice President (President-elect) of the American Institute for Indonesian Studies (AIFIS) and also serves on the Executive Board of the Indonesia and Timor Leste Studies Committee (ITLSC). She has held a research/teaching position at the MacMillan Center for International and Area Studies, Yale University, the Weatherhead East Asian Studies, Columbia University, the Asian Research Institute (ARI), National University of Singapore, and the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), Jakarta.



**PROGRAM OVERVIEW/OBJECTIVES:** The primary objective of this program is to provide participants with the opportunity to gain firsthand living and field experiences in Indonesia, the largest Muslim-majority democracy in the world, which is known for its moderate and multi-cultural traditions and thriving economy. Students will be provided with a range of opportunities not only to visit historical heritage sites, monuments, and museums, but also to directly interact with local communities and university students through daily activities and excursions coordinated by local universities in Yogyakarta with the program director. Through those daily activities, excursions, group discussions, lectures and interviews around the city,

students will learn about broader political development, the socio-economic conditions of majority and minority communities, and the historical background of religious and ethnic conflict and reconciliation in the country so as to gain a better understanding of urgent contemporary issues related to democracy, multi-culturalism, minority rights, political Islam, ethnic conflict, gender issues, and civil society.



**PROGRAM SITE(S):** The program will take place in Yogyakarta (popularly known as Jogja), the capital city of the Special Region of Yogyakarta, Central Java, Indonesia. Known for its historical religious heritages, arts and traditional textile industries (*batik*), educational center, and multi-cultural and moderate Islamic traditions, the city is one of the most popular sites for visitors, local and foreigner alike. It will offer easy access to historical heritage sites such as the Buddhist monument “Borobudur”, Hindu temple complex “Prambanan,” royal palaces (*kraton* or sultan’s residence complex), as well as traditional Islamic schools (*madrasah* and *pesantren*) run by prominent Muslim movements. Jogja also houses a number of prominent educational institutions and programs and NGOs working on religious pluralism and conflict resolution. It will offer an ideal place for students to observe and learn firsthand local religious and cultural practices, rituals, and values and how these interact with political and socio-economic development. Program participants will stay in an accommodation located on Gadjah Mada University (UGM) campus, and participate in various daily activities and excursions around the city coordinated by local universities, the American Institute for Indonesian Studies (AIFIS) Yogyakarta office and the program director.

**HIGHLIGHTS:** Main activities of the program include not only lectures and presentations by guest speakers from local universities, government agencies, religious organizations and NGOs, but also visits to local universities (e.g., UGM, Indonesian Islamic University) to hold group discussions and interviews with local students on selected topics concerning current international

affairs. Daily excursions will also be arranged to visit mosques, traditional religious schools, art exhibitions, cultural and music performances, historical sites and museums, royal palaces and nearby villages to observe local industries and other socio-economic activities such as the making of the traditional textile called *batik*. In addition to those daily activities around the city, a weekend tour to historical heritage sites outside the city, Borobudur and Prambanan temple complexes, will be arranged.

**PROGRAM AUDIENCE:** Space is limited and qualified applicants will be accepted on a first-come-first-serve basis. The program is open to all students both at undergraduate and graduate levels, including non-traditional students and professionals interested in international and comparative politics and Southeast Asian studies in general, and Indonesia, religion and politics, ethnic conflict, and Islam in particular. Students who are learning or planning to learn the Indonesian language are also encouraged to participate in conjunction with their language training.

**INSTRUCTION METHOD:** Weekday seminar sessions (5-day/per week) are normally held in a meeting room in the hostel, Wisma MM UGM (<http://www.mmugmhotel.com/>) located on UGM campus and include daily seminars and lectures by the program director (Professor Hamayotsu) and guest speakers/lecturers invited from local universities and organizations. Half-day activities outside the campus are arranged daily with local universities and organizations. Those activities include group discussions and interviews on selected topics and issues with local students, as well as visits to local religious communities and organizations, historical sites and museums, cultural performances and exhibitions, civil society organizations, government agencies, and nearby villages and communities. Students will have opportunities to collaborate with local students and conduct “fieldwork” through those daily activities and mini excursions and be asked to present their activities and field findings in the seminar sessions while preparing brief reports and their individual research projects, which they will submit to complete the program.

#### **Course Requirements for Undergraduate Students:**

- Activity participation in pre- and post-program sessions, daily seminar/lecture sessions and extracurricular activities (40%)
- Electronic submission of daily journals (5 entries per week = 30%)
- Presentation of extra-class activities and excursions (10%)
- Completion of a project paper (approx. 6-7 pages) based on a selected topic relevant to the program themes (20%)

#### **Course Requirements for Graduate Students:**

- Activity participation in pre- and post-program sessions, daily seminar/lecture sessions and extracurricular activities (40%)\*\*
- Electronic submission of daily journals (5 entries per week = 30%)
- Presentation of fieldwork and interview findings (10%)
- Completion of a research project paper (approx. 10-12 pages) based on a selected topic relevant to the program themes (20%)
- Individual consultation with the program director to prepare and design a research project and fieldwork/interviews/library research is expected and counted towards the participation grade (see \*\* above)

**PROGRAM ACADEMIC CREDIT:** For satisfactory participation in the program, participants will receive 3 semester hours of undergraduate or graduate credit in one of the following NIU courses. There is no academic prerequisite to participate in the program, but interested applicants are required to gain permission of the program director before enrollment. A knowledge of Indonesian is not required.

### UNDERGRADUATE CREDIT:

<b>POLS 371 - Politics of Southeast Asia</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Comparative study of governmental and political institutions and processes in countries such as Vietnam, Malaysia, Kampuchea, Laos, Thailand, and Indonesia. Focus on issues such as ideological and minority conflicts, insurgencies, refugees, military rule, prospects for democracy, and United States interests in Southeast Asia. Recommended: At least sophomore standing.

<b>POLS 376 - Political Violence</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Introduction to theories of political conflict, political opposition, and methods of concluding violent conflicts, including war. Recommended: At least sophomore standing.

<b>POLS 378 – Political Islam</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Analysis of various political and social phenomena in predominantly-Muslim nations including Islamic movements, religious parties, Islam and democracy, Islamic courts and laws, women's rights, religious radicalism and violence.	

### GRADUATE CREDIT:

<b>POLS 664 - Politics of Identity: Ethnicity, Religion and Conflict</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Analysis of the various sources and forms of identity politics across the world with special reference to Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe as well as the U.S. Focuses on issues such as nationalism, ethnic and sectarian violence, culture and democracy, political Islam, ethnic/religious minorities, and religious movements and parties.

<b>POLS 667 – Seminar in Political Development</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Reading seminar devoted to a comprehensive survey of the literature on the problems of political development and social modernization in the developing nations.

<b>POLS 670 – Reading Seminar in Southeast Asian Politics</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Examination of the literature concerning the diverse political cultures of Southeast Asia, the salient political forces, and the major political problems of development, integration, and stability in the area.	

**INDEPENDENT STUDY/RESEARCH PROJECT:** Individuals desiring to earn *three additional hours* of undergraduate or graduate credit may do so by engaging in an independent study-research project under the direction of Professor Kikue Hamayotsu, program director. The research report should be at least 10 pages for undergraduate credit and 20 pages for graduate credit.

**Requirements for Independent Study/Research Project:** In order to obtain approval from course or major department chair and Kikue Hamayotsu, program director, applicants must:

1. Relate the project to a topic or subject introduced during the program.
2. Complete and submit the project for final evaluation to Kikue Hamayotsu, program director no later than **August 30, 2017**.

Participants who enroll for the independent research project will receive 3 semester hours of credit in one of the following NIU courses:

<b>POLS 496 – Independent Study in Political Science</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Special readings and topics in political science. Open only to junior and senior majors in political science with a GPA of 3.00 or above and 12 semester hours in political science. May be repeated to a maximum of 6 semester hours. <b>Prerequisite:</b> Consent of Department.	
<b>OR</b>	
<b>INTL 401 Study Abroad Programs</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Course work undertaken as part of an approved university study abroad program. Discipline-based course used to reflect credit given, with departmental approval, for course work for which there is no NIU equivalent course available. May be repeated to a maximum of 9 semester hours.	

<b>GRADUATE CREDIT:</b>	
<b>POLS 690 Independent Study</b>	<b>3 semester hours</b>
<b>Description:</b> Supervised research training in planning, design, execution, and analysis of political science research. Required of all graduate students in political science. Master's students may use a maximum of 9 semester hours toward degree completion. Doctoral students may use a maximum of 39 semester hours toward degree completion. S/U grading. <b>Prerequisite:</b> Consent of Department.	

**APPLICATION AND ADMISSION PROCEDURES:** The program is open to both undergraduate and graduate level students who meet the NIU general admission requirements, and who are interested in international and comparative politics and Southeast Asian Studies in general, and Indonesia, religion and politics, ethnic conflict, and Islam in particular. Currently enrolled students must meet College of Liberal Arts and Sciences course GPA requirements.

Graduate level students must also meet NIU Graduate School admission, course and GPA requirements.

Students must be in good academic and disciplinary standing at the time of application. Students who are on academic or disciplinary probation are not eligible to participate in study abroad programs. **Applicants must participate in the *entire* program and satisfy NIU undergraduate or graduate admission and course requirements.**

Students cannot have any encumbrances against their NIU records. Any encumbrances placed on a student's records by NIU (i.e., the Graduate School, Undergraduate Admissions, Bursar's Office, Accounts Receivable, Registration and Records, Office of Student Conduct, Health Services, Parking Services, etc.) must be cleared before a student is granted admission to a study abroad program.

For undergraduate students to be admitted to the program, an applicant's official transcript must be on file in the NIU Study Abroad Office. Students who are currently enrolled at NIU, or who have previously enrolled at NIU, do not need to request an official transcript; the Study Abroad Office will make this request on behalf of the applicant. Students who want to participate in the program and earn academic credit from NIU who have **not** previously enrolled at NIU, or who are not **currently** enrolled at NIU, should ask the Registrar at their institution to forward an official transcript as soon as possible to the Study Abroad Office. (Student-issued transcripts and photocopies are not acceptable.) Questions relating to the admission requirements or transcripts should be directed to the Study Abroad Office.

Students who desire to obtain graduate credit must either be admitted to a graduate program within the NIU Graduate School, or be admitted to the status of a "student-at-large" (SAL) within NIU's Graduate School. For students to be admitted to the program for graduate credit, the applicant's official transcript must be on file in the NIU SAO. Students who are currently enrolled at NIU, or who have previously enrolled at NIU, do not need to request an official transcript. However, students who will participate in the program in order to earn academic credit as an SAL (students who have not currently enrolled, nor are previously enrolled at NIU) must provide a transcript from the baccalaureate institution and from any institution at which graduate credit has been earned. This document must be provided to the SAO before a student can be admitted as an SAL to the program. (Student issued transcripts and photocopies are not acceptable.)

The online process provides guidance on requesting information, advising, or applying for the program. Please note that at the time of application, applicants will be expected to submit a signature verification form and copy of their ID to the Study Abroad Office. **\$200 APPLICATION FEE/DEPOSIT:** A \$200 application fee/deposit is required of all applicants. The \$200 is broken down into \$100 for the non-refundable application fee and \$100 for a program deposit. Both the application fee and the deposit will be applied to the total balance of the program cost. The \$100 deposit is refundable only if the participant withdraws prior to the withdrawal deadline indicated on the program materials or for medical reasons verified by a physician if the withdrawal takes place after the withdrawal deadline.

The \$200 application fee/deposit will be charged to NIU students' NIU Bursar's account. (Checks and money orders cannot be accepted from NIU students.) Non-NIU students must submit a check or money order in the amount of \$200. More detailed instructions can be found on the website.

**IMPORTANT** – All applications will be categorized as “Pending – No Deposit” until the \$200 application fee/deposit has been received (or, in the case of non-NIU students, once a check has been received). The Study Abroad Office will not consider or process applications without the \$200 application fee/deposit. In order to reserve your place in the program you must submit the \$200 deposit within 14 days of application. After 14 days applications without a deposit will be inactivated.

**APPLICATION DEADLINE: ~~March 1, 2017.~~**

**Deadline extended to March 3, 2017.**

A minimum of five students is required in order to operate the program. Upon acceptance into the program, applicants must change their status to “Committed” and complete *all* post-decisions items on the Study Abroad Portal in order to be considered an active participant in the program.

**ACCOMMODATIONS AND MEALS:** Participants will reside in university-owned hotel, Wisma MM UGM, in twin bed rooms with private bathroom and toilet, air-conditioning, and free Wi-Fi connection and will be provided three meals daily throughout the period of residency.

**AIR TRANSPORTATION:** Individuals will be responsible for making their own air travel arrangements between the U.S. and Yogyakarta and for purchasing their tickets from a travel agent or airline of their choice. (Travel insurance is recommended.)

Participants should keep in mind that in order to arrive in Yogyakarta in time for the official beginning of the program, they should plan to depart the U.S. **no later than May 19, 2017**. There is a 12-hour time difference between DeKalb and Yogyakarta.



For information regarding airfares and airlines students may wish to check-out additional airfare sites on the Internet.

**Important** - The Study Abroad Office advises all participants that flight reservations for this program should not be booked until:

- a. After the March 1, 2017 application deadline  
**AND**
- b. The SAO has accepted the minimum number of participants needed to operate this program.

This advisory is given so that participants do not find themselves financially responsible for airline tickets should it be necessary to cancel the program. (See section entitled, **CANCELLATION OF THE PROGRAM**)

**LAND TRANSPORTATION:** For program-related travel the group will travel by private/chartered vehicle arranged by the program director. This transportation is provided as part of the NIU program cost.

**PASSPORT: --IMPORTANT--**All participants are required to possess a valid passport by March 1, 2017 Important Note: U.S. passports must be valid SIX months beyond the intended stay overseas. Individuals who do not currently possess a valid passport should apply for one immediately. Expedited services can be requested or participants can apply in person at the Chicago Passport Agency. If applicants are not within the Chicago area, they must apply at the nearest passport agency. Information on acquiring a U.S. passport is available at the U.S. State Department's website: <https://travel.state.gov/content/passports/en/passports.html>. Foreign passport holders may need special visas for travel **and are responsible for obtaining all necessary visas.**



**VISA:** Participants will be required to obtain a Visa-on-Arrival at the port of entry which is valid for up to 30 days at a cost of \$35. The major ports of entry include Soekarno Hatta Airport (Jakarta) or Ngurah Rai Airport (Bali). **PASSPORT, VISA AND ISIC PHOTOS:** You may have your passport photo(s) taken in the NIU Study Abroad Office. Photos are \$5.00 for two photos. Photos must be purchased in multiples of two. Photos are usually developed while you wait. We accept exact cash, personal check or we can charge it to your bursar account. Study Abroad Office hours are 8:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. (closed over the lunch hour) and 1:00 – 4:30 p.m. It is strongly recommended that students get an extra pair of photos taken to keep on their person while in China in case of a missing or stolen passport.



**HEALTH REQUIREMENTS/VACCINATIONS:** In order to enter Indonesia, students are advised to contact their primary care physician and/or the University Health Services as soon as possible, and at least eight weeks before the program begins to allow time for immunizations to take effect. Some vaccines need to be given over a period of months. The NIU University Health Service can advise students on what immunizations are required and can administer most immunizations. Most immunizations require a fee.

**NIU MAJOR MEDICAL INSURANCE:** NIU Student health insurance is required for participation in an NIU study abroad program. Participants not currently enrolled in the NIU Major Medical Insurance Plan will be enrolled by the Study Abroad Office. The NIU Major Medical Insurance Plan has a \$250 deductible clause. Students requiring medical attention will be expected to pay any related costs and then file a claim with the NIU Student Insurance Office after returning to the States. Receipts showing payment for all medical expenses are required for reimbursement.



**INTERNATIONAL STUDENT I.D. CARD:** The ISIC card is provided as part of the program cost. The I.D. card can provide discount on international airfare and other travel. Students will receive an application and instructions for obtaining this card when accepted into the program.



The International Student Identity Card also includes a limited health and accident insurance policy which is only valid outside the U.S. Students will have to pay bills at the time of treatment and will be reimbursed later.

**NIU PROGRAM COST:** The program cost pays for the following cost related services:

- 1) Hotel rooms (twin-room shared) and all meals daily while in Yogyakarta.
- 2) Program related land transportation in Yogyakarta.
- 3) Admission fees to cultural and historical sites visited as part of the daily schedule.
- 4) International Student I.D. Card
- 5) Three or six hours of undergraduate or graduate credit.
- 6) NIU Student Medical Insurance.

**FINANCIAL AID:** As a participant in a study abroad program through NIU, applicants may be eligible for: Pell Grant, SEOG, Perkins Loan, PLUS Loan, Subsidized or Unsubsidized Stafford Loan, MAP Award or your privately awarded scholarship with consent of awarding organization.

**WITHDRAWAL FROM THE SEMINAR:** Applicants withdrawing from the program after March 1, 2017 will not be refunded the \$100 program deposit.

Applicants withdrawing from the seminar after this date will also be held accountable for any funds obligated to overseas vendors and agents on the applicant's behalf. This provision is in effect even if the applicant has not submitted the \$100 deposit or additional payments, and if the applicant is applying for financial aid.

If the applicant must withdraw after March 1, 2017 for medical reasons, funds obligated on their behalf to overseas vendors can only be refunded if:

- 1) The request is submitted to the Study Abroad Office in writing and accompanied by a signed statement stating that travel is not advised from a physician on the physician's letterhead; **and**
- 2) NIU is able to obtain refunds from overseas vendors and agents.
- 3) The program still has the minimum number of participants required to operate.

**CANCELLATION OF THE PROGRAM:** The Study Abroad Office reserves the right to cancel this program if the minimum required enrollment is not attained. If, prior to the commencement of the program, a U.S. State Department Travel Warning is issued for Indonesia, all applicants will be notified promptly of the warning and the possibility of cancellation of the program. If, during the course of the program, a U.S. State Department Travel Warning is issued for Indonesia, students will be promptly notified of the warning and the advisability of canceling the program.
